COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1) To learn basic concepts and meanings of leisure, recreation and play, in contemporary society
- 2) To develop an understanding of the dynamics, functions and benefits of leisure
- 2) To explore how one's own identity is expressed through leisure behavior
- 3) To develop an awareness and understanding of the importance of leisure in our lives
- 4) To learn about the significance of leisure "geography" as to "space and place"
- 5) To learn the role of leisure in popular culture
- 6) To gain an awareness of leisure's relationship to today's technology
- 7) To learn about the realities of "taboo" recreation
- 8) To learn of both the lack of and potential of equity in leisure
