## **Guidelines for Responding to Student Writing at the Content Level**

- 1. Read the text through once without making any marks on it. Resist the temptation to mark the text in any way by putting your pen or pencil away.
- 2. After reading, identify something the writer has done well.
- 3. Respond in writing to an idea that has provoked or interested you.
- 4. Compose a comment (in writing) that might promote revision and move the essay forward. Concentrate on higher-order concerns of ideas, organization, development, and overall clarity as opposed to the lower-order concerns of style, grammar, and mechanics.
- 5. Instead of marking surface errors in the essay, note at the end of your comment 1 or 2 patterns of error that the writer should attend to as they proofread a final draft. Lower-order concerns are lower not because they are unimportant but because they cannot be efficiently attended to until higher-order concerns have been resolved.
