

"I make jokes about this, but I know she is not stupid or dumb; she didn't have the advantage high school graduates have, she only got up to tenth grade. But still, all of this is sometimes overwhelming, and my way of getting back at her is reminding her that she failed the exams" says Michael, who now prefers to joke about the issue and not fight with his wife anymore for not spending time together.

Michael explaints that one night, Julia was studying for an exam, little Michael did not seem to stop running around, and he was so tired and stressed up from work, that he decided to take little Michael to his grandmother's house. "I was getting desperate, I couldn't control him and Julia was busy, so I just left him with my mother for the entire weekend. But I paid for it; he was mad at me for the next three or four days," recalls Michael.

Julia says that for her, the hardest thing between going to school, working a parttime job in a department store, and taking care of a family, is to leave her baby for so long. "He needs me, and when I leave he is crying because he wants to be with me. But one of the good things about this, is that sometimes I enjoy the fact that my husband misses me more than before, than when I was all day at home," Ms. Ramirez says, with a big smile in her face.
