The following graduate courses may be taken in place of these undergraduate courses: [REC 702](#) (in place of [REC 422](#)), [REC 706](#) (in place of [REC 361](#)), [REC 680](#) (in place of [REC 240](#)), and [REC 680](#) (in place of any other 300-level elective). The student must receive permission from both the academic undergraduate and graduate advisors.
